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in recent years there has been increased attention paid to the importance of assessment in geographical education the chosen subject for this book assessment is an important tool for collecting information about student learning and for providing timely data to inform key stakeholders including students teachers parents and policymakers to be effective assessment needs to be valid reliable and fair validity is about ensuring that we assess what we claim we are assessing reliability is about measuring performance and understanding in a consistent way without validity and reliability assessment is unlikely to provide equitable opportunities for students to demonstrate what they know and can do as geography educators it is therefore important that we identify the core concepts and skills in geography that we want students to master we need a clear understanding of what the progression of learning looks like for each concept and skill so we can develop fit for purpose assessments that track and improve student learning while there is a substantial literature on evidence based assessment in secondary school contexts research
